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# FROM the DIRECTOR



#### DEAR MEMBERS,

We enter the New Year with a sense of gratitude to all of you for your loyal support of the Museum. Thanks to you, we had a successful and exciting fall with the opening of several exhibitions and an exuberant Día de los Muertos celebration.

In October, we celebrated two exhibitions, *Friends and Lovers* and *Accretion: Works by Latin American Women*. Both shows highlighted the creativity of contemporary artists from particular communities, furthering the Museum's commitment to inclusivity. SBMA also collaborated with

the Pacific Pride Foundation, the leading LGBTQ+ organization in our area, on the opening events. The party drew an astonishing 450 attendees with more spilling out onto the Front Terrace and State Street to enjoy the music of the Mariachi Arcoiris, the self-described "world's first LGBTQ+ mariachi band." As museums work to find new and younger audiences, this partnership marks significant progress.

Our 35th Día de los Muertos was, as always, a popular community event and the second year of a collaboration with the Museum of Contemporary Art Santa Barbara. Students from the Museum's outreach programs created altars honoring their deceased loved ones, and art activities were held onsite and on the Front Terrace. The event drew nearly 1,700 people into the Museum with many more outside enjoying the procession of performers featuring traditional dance and music from Oaxaca and Guerrero. As I walked through the galleries, I was moved by the stories of loss by children, as families speaking Spanish paid their respects to relatives, friends, and even pets.

The curators have collaborated on a reinstallation of our historical American and European art collections in the Ridley-Tree Gallery. This new approach aligns with how museums around the world, including the Tate Britain and the Museum of Modern Art in New York, are reinterpreting their collections by including more diverse artists, highlighting connections between artists, and providing more thematic contextual information. The goal is to mix things up to create surprises and excitement in the galleries.

We look forward to sharing this and so much more in the New Year.

# MODERN LIFE: A Global Artworld, 1850-1950

Ongoing Ridley-Tree Gallery

A dazzling reinstallation with artists from North America, South America, Asia, and Europe confronting the cataclysmic changes of the 19th and early 20th centuries.

re live with linked economies and global instantaneous communication. Change is constant. People are on the go. Modern life with its incessant movement began in the mid-19th century as undersea telegraph cables, railroads, steamships, and colonial powers encircled the world. These same changes created a global art world with centers in cities such as Paris, Mexico City, and New York. Reflecting this internationalization, artists in this gallery come from North America, South America, Asia, and Europe. Their networks crossed continents and oceans, and these artworks grapple with and sometimes avoid the epochal changes they were living through.

The Santa Barbara Museum of Art has a focused but encyclopedic collection, and Modern Life uses its collection, salted with a few loans, to tell a sweeping, global story. There are sections titled "Abstraction," "Global Surrealism," "Tourism," as well as the confluence of "Industry, Science, and Art." An illustrated timeline shares information on the collection's growth since the 1940s. Two gallery areas will have rotating selections from the photography collection and a few gems from the 3,000 plus collection of caricatures, including works by artists from Japan, France, and Mexico. The Museum's holdings of sculptures by August Rodin are on display as well.

There is a striking variety of artists on view including Claude Monet, Henri Matisse, Mary Cassatt, George Bellows, Georgia O'Keeffe, John Singer Sargent, Josef Albers, Wassily Kandinsky, and Edward Hopper. In the Global Surrealism section, the under-appreciated California woman painter Dorr Bothwell hangs near Salvador Dalí, Wifredo Lam, a Cuban surrealist, David Alfaro Siqueiros, a Serbian surrealist Milena Pavlović-Barili, and the American Kay Sage. There is also a grouping of paintings of flowers bundled together as a bouquet by the husband-wife pair of Henri and Victoria Fantin-Latour, Alfredo Ramos Martínez, Florine Stettheimer, Piet Mondrian, and Marsden Hartley.



# **STILLNESS**







Through March 16, 2025 Photography Gallery

Simply installed in the Santa Barbara Museum of Art's Photography Gallery, Stillness invites contemplation and introspection via a select and small group of beautifully composed and printed images.

The exhibition demonstrates how artists have perceptively used the unique capabilities of the photographic medium to create images that resonate with the invisible experiences of stillness, time, and silence. Begun in October 2022, this installation marks the sixth and final iteration of this popular and wellreceived exhibition series.

# SEA of ICE:

ECHOES OF THE EUROPEAN ROMANTIC ERA

January 19 - August 24, 2025 Ala Story Gallery

This focused exhibition centers on the SBMA's grand James Casebere photograph, Sea of Ice (2014). Casebere based his 21st century work on German artist Caspar David Friedrich's (1774–1840) painting of the same name from 1823–24, famous since its debut two centuries ago for its dramatic, hyper-realistic vision of the remnants of an Arctic naval disaster.

editations on human aspirations gone awry, both Sea of Ice images represent aspects of the early 19th-Century European Romantic era. Romantic artists, writers, thinkers, and composers questioned the science and philosophy of the 18th century, which to them drily reduced the complexities of human beings and the universe they lived in to theories based only in science and what was considered "rational." To the Romantics, such explanations ignored the value of an individual's unique experience of their world. Instead, artists like Friedrich often portrayed scenes of nature awe-inspiring and grand, beautiful but sometimes unsettling—as representations of the variety, intensity and worth of human perception and personal feeling.

Sea of Ice: Echoes of the European Romantic Era includes paintings, photographs, prints, and drawings from the Museum's collection, from the 19th to the 21st century, which arose during or reflect on this important era in human history. Today, we encounter a similar predicament that the Romantics faced: with the rise of AI, genetic reordering, and the perils and promise of science, how do we represent our relationship to nature and its future? In this era of climate change, Sea of Ice also calls to mind the precarious Arctic and Antarctic worlds, and the ever-more personal repercussions of a warming planet.



# Suit of Armor Installation

his stunning helmet is part of a superbly crafted Japanese Suit of Armor that is being prepared for display in the Museum's Campbell and Gould Galleries in January.

A newly promised gift, the armor was worn by Lord Yūki Hideyasu (1574-1607), the second son of Tokugawa Ieyasu (1543-1616) the founding Shogun of the Edo period. Though born a Tokugawa, Yūki Hideyasu grew up under the Toyotomi clan as an adopted son and later married into the Yūki clan taking their family name. The double-family crests (hollyhock and paulownia representing the Tokugawa and Toyotomi families) seen on the armor and helmet support the complex history of Yūki Hideyasu who lived during the tumultuous founding decades of the Edo shogunate.

### **CONTEMPORARY ART**

In Hank Willis Thomas's Ex parte *U.S.*, the U.S. flag appears clearly above ghostly figures. If, however, one was to shine a light on the image, Japanese-American school children would appear, hands to heart as they recite the Pledge of Allegiance. The photograph was taken during the period when Japanese-Americans were forcefully relocated to concentration camps under the false pretext that they were likely to be enemies of the United States, then at war with the Empire of Japan. People with as little as 1/16 Japanese heritage could be incarcerated.

#### **NEW MEDIA**

Born and raised in Santa Barbara, Los Angeles-based artist Petra **Cortright** adapts the internet into an artistic subject, aesthetic medium, and artmaking tool. Using her digital painting geometry formulas\_gleitschirmfliegen "GOLF III harlequin" (also in the collection) as a springboard, this infinitely looping video animation places a number of engaging colorful creatures, a menacingly coiled snake and hungry frog among them, into the original painting's still, largely desert-like landscape. This video work was created by Cortwright specifically for SBMA's new media exhibition Mediated Nature, which debuted in the Ala Story Gallery for the August 2021 grand reopening, and is a generous gift to the Museum by the artist and her gallery in Los Angeles.

### EDUCATION PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT

# Mindful Looking and Making

Statistics, news reports, as well as internal evaluations demonstrate an increase in student anxiety and depression in our local school district since the pandemic. County Superintendent of Schools Susan Salcido in a talk to the Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse (CADA) mentors at the Museum highlighted the priority of behavioral health support as early as pre-kindergarten.

Local schools increasingly focus on SEL, or social emotional learning, as vital to student well-being and academic performance. The Museum, working with teachers, counselors, and organizations such as CADA and Kind Mind, is adapting or creating programs to respond to this increase in student feelings of anxiety, sadness, distraction, and hopelessness.

Promoting mindfulness is one of the suggested ways to help students with mental health issues. Dr. Vivian Valentin, Director of Kind Mind, has worked with the schools and the Education Department, including Teaching Artist Nicola Ghersen, to create a new one-hour program called Mindful Looking and Making. It starts with half an hour in the galleries led by Vivian, followed by a half an hour making a related art project that continues and amplifies the practice in the gallery. The first group of "engaged and curious" fourth graders were enthusiastic. Most of their final shares were something like: I feel "good," "free," "peaceful," or "calm," or they mentioned something they discovered or noticed in the painting or themselves that they were excited about. In the studio, they didn't want to stop drawing when time was up!

After that first class, Vivian said "I feel so lucky to have the chance to facilitate mindful experiences to students and their teachers and chaperones. It fills my heart with hope seeing them practice."

An observer added, "Thank you for your work. This offering will help students and teachers regain focus and remain calm."

The Museum is grateful to have the opportunity to support students and teachers as together we learn to practice mindfulness, to reduce stress, create empathy, foster kindness, and empower students beyond their visit.




### Tribute: MARY LAUN "GINA" JANNOTTA




# ANNUAL FUND DOLLARS AT WORK: Providing Cross-Curricular Education through ArtReach
