

BLUE HAIKU

Inspired by April Street's installation, The Mariners' Grand Staircase (Armoured Stars, Flying Clouds)

A haiku is a poem consisting of only three lines and is made up of a five-seven-five syllable structure. Haikus often features an image, or a pair of images, meant to depict the essence of a specific moment in time, like a snapshot.

Artist April Street's installation, *The Mariners' Grand Staircase* (Armoured Stars, Flying Clouds), uses a deep dark marine blue as both background and frame. Why do you think she chose blue?

Blue is a cool color, associated with water and the sky. Blue is also used to describe a sad or melancholy mood as in "I felt so blue when my best friend moved away."

Thinking about the color blue and the feelings it brings to the surface, write a 5-7-5 syllable haiku that expresses your associations with that color; what it makes you feel or think of, or a description of something blue.

TRADITIONAL HAIKU STRUCTURE

- There are only three lines, totaling 17 syllables.
- The first line is 5 syllables.
- The second line is 7 syllables.
- The third line is 5 syllables like the first.
- Punctuation and capitalization are up to the poet, and need not follow rigid rules used in structuring sentences.
