
# THE PRIVATE UNIVERSE OF JAMES CASTLE:

# Drawings from the William Louis-Dreyfus Foundation and James Castle Collection and Archive

June 25 - September 17, 2023 McCormick and Wasserman and Family Galleries

With more than 90 works, this exhibition features many of the most beautiful and accomplished drawings created by the extraordinarily gifted, self-taught artist James Castle (1899–1977). The Santa Barbara Museum of Art is the presentation's sole venue and this will be the first exhibition of Castle's works in Southern California.

**♦** The show highlights the artist's remarkable technical skills and attempts to foster a better understanding of his evocative and unconventional images, particularly his landscapes and architectural interior scenes. Unfortunately, the common perception of Castle and his art has tended to be very limited due to emphasis on his physical impairments—he was profoundly deaf and largely mute—and his geographic isolation, working in rural Idaho. The exhibition and accompanying scholarly catalogue places Castle in a larger artistic and cultural context and explores the imaginative innovations of his works, mainly drawings produced with soot from a woodstove and his saliva, rendered on scraps of found paper.

The majority of objects in the exhibition are on loan from the two preeminent depositories of James Castle's art, the collections of the William Louis-Dreyfus Foundation in Mount Kisco, NY and the James Castle Collection and Archive in Boise, ID, with a number of other drawings borrowed from private collections, including a group of heretofore never publicly displayed or published works owned by members of the Castle family. Castle's artworks have previously been featured in shows at the Philadelphia Museum of Art and the Museo Nacional Centro de Arte Reina Sofia, Madrid, and are found in many museum collections, including those of the Museum of Modern Art and Whitney Museum of American Art, New York.


# LYONEL FEININGER/ANDREAS FEININGER:

This exhibition compares and contrasts the visions of these two artists who depicted similar elements of their different worlds in entirely different media, but with the same effect of uniquely contributing to the advance of 20thcentury Modernism and its forms and ideas.

# RECENT ACQUISITIONS



#### PHOTOGRAPHY AND NEW MEDIA

Japanese artist Tatsuo Miyajima uses technology found in our media-driven lives to create wondrous works of art imbued with timeless notions of body, mind, and spirit. The Museum's 2019-20 Tatsuo Miyajima exhibition, the first United Statesorganized solo presentation of this renowned artist's work in over 20 years, resulted in the acquisition of Time Waterfall, the towering column of cascading numbers installed in the Museum's Park entrance that has become an SBMA beacon. Delicate, spare, and discrete in contrast to Time Waterfall's mass and scale, C.F. Pro Tru Sensitive is made up of small blue LED numerals that count down from 9 to 1 at differing speeds but which never reach 0, evidence of Miyajima's philosophy inspired by his Buddhist practice: Keep Changing, Connect with Everything, Continue Forever. This generous gift of the Estate of Anita Reiner (d. 2013) fully reflects the daring commitment of this Washington, DC-area collector to the most advanced forms and expressions found in contemporary art.



#### **CONTEMPORARY ART**

Whitney Bedford's paintings are utterly contemporary with their brash colors but also deeply probe the history of landscape and its representations. Veduta means "view" in Italian and usually signaled large landscapes full of details. The 18th-century Italian artists Canaletto and Bellotto are probably the two most well-known practitioners. For this painting, Bedford has looked to Georges Lacombe (1868–1916) and his painting Red Pines (c. 1895), but she had added two plants in silhouette, which could be Queen Anne's Lace and an unidentified flower, perhaps a garden pea or a lily. They are neither pines nor another kind of tree, but they have similar brachial forms. Bedford shows the underlying mathematical patterns that guide the growth of plants across species of vastly different sizes and taxonomies.

#### **ASIAN ART**

Kano Isen'in Naganobu was the seventh-generation head of the Edo Kobikicho branch of the Kano school, the longest lived and most influential school of painting in Japanese history. Since its founding in the 15th century, the Kano artists served prominent clients, including the shogunate and feudal lords, aristocrats, clergy, and, increasingly in the 19thcentury, affluent merchants. Naganobu's painting of nature exemplifies one of the celebrated Kano styles that merged the ink and brushwork emphasized in Chinese paintings with the decorative colors and patterns associated with native Japanese sensibilities. Here, the colorful and meticulously outlined rendering of peony flowers and birds boldly contrasts with the softly inked and monochromatic tonal depiction of the garden rocks. Naganobu was granted the highest rank *horin* (Seal of the Law) in 1816, as indicated by the signature on this painting, "Brushed by Isen'in Horin."











# Transformation: Personal Stories of Change, Acceptance, and Evolution

On February 12 before a packed house, 15 participants ranging in age from 12 to 70 provided a truly transformative experience of art, word, and music. This free concert in the Museum's Mary Craig Auditorium featured 7 student composers and musicians from a Museum workshop led by Grammy Award-winning saxophonist and composer Ted Nash who joined them on stage. In addition, 8 SBCC students in the Creative Writing program shared their personal stories as selected by program director and award-winning poet Joshua Escobar. Responding in part to artist Joan Tanner's unorthodox use of materials and inspired by Nash's original composition first performed with Jazz at Lincoln Center Orchestra, these young artists explored the idea of transformation, both personal and collective, bringing word and music together in this exuberant celebration of the expressive and empathetic power of art. From bossa nova to fugue and from poems to personal revelations, these emerging artists of all ages showed not only talent, but passion, commitment, respect, and courage in taking the stage.

This program was a partnership between the Santa Barbara Museum of Art, the Santa Barbara Symphony, and SBCC's Creative Writing program and is the fifth time the Museum has partnered with the incomparable Ted Nash.

#### A Q + A WITH KIM HAYES:



#### Do you have a favorite memory at the Santa Barbara Art Museum?

I have many happy memories of the Museum. Michael and I met in July 2008 at one of the Nights events... these wonderful art-themed cocktail parties were really the best gathering in town. I was watching the band in the main room, when I glanced into the gallery, a tall handsome man with a big smile on his face was walking my way. I glanced over my shoulder to see

who he might be smiling at, it was as though he had recognized someone he knew. A moment later, when he came up from behind and said hello, I realized he was looking at me! I will always cherish that look on his face.

I grew up in Santa Barbara and my earliest memory of the Museum is of Ludington Court with the gorgeous statues, impluvium, and loutrophoros, as well as roman glass. I've been in love with the ancient world and art history since then. Given this love of that space, I was concerned with the massive renovation project. I knew my parents would be too. When I first visited the new Museum I was impressed. Yes it's entirely different, but has a beautiful and compelling presence. I took my parents to see the Van Gogh exhibition and they were both greatly impressed with the new Museum as well as the exhibit.

#### What is your occupation?

I founded MAISON K on Coast Village Road 20 years ago. I sell women's clothing and accessories that I source at trade shows in Paris and Milan and have made for us in Italy mainly Turin, Florence, Perugia, and Positano be it shirting, cashmere, dresses, or hats. I source in Istanbul where I buy textiles that I have made into clothing as well as pillows. I also sell Astier de Villatte, an exquisite line of handmade ceramics, candles, and incense made in Paris. It's an eclectic mix of special things I love.

#### How important do you think art is in people's lives?

Art is fundamental to the human experience from the beginning of time so it's a vital part of our humanity.

#### Why are you an SBMA Member?

I have happy memories of the Museum my whole life, and in fact majored in Art History at UCSB. My mother was a docent for some years while I was growing up. It's really wonderful to support the Museum and its outreach as well as to receive so much in return. We love the travel program which is a treat for me to be on holiday and be in so many interesting places and learn so much. We just have to show up on time. No logistics, no planning, and always an incredible experience. I wish I could go on every trip!




