Happy New Year!

We hope that you have been enjoying all that the Museum has to offer, from the spectacular photography exhibition, *A Time of Gifts: Six Years of Photographs Given to the Collection, 2016-2022*, to *The Architecture of Collage: Marshall Brown*, to the reinstalled permanent collection galleries. Coming soon are two new, thought-provoking exhibitions featuring the curatorial talents of our contemporary art department. *Scenes from a Marriage: Ed & Nancy Kienholz* opens January 29 and celebrates the recent and important gift of Edward and Nancy Kienholz's monumental installation *Bout Round Eleven* (1982). Then, opening February 12, the major show *Out of Joint: Joan Tanner* will be the most extensive exhibition of the artist's work in California to date and will represent a homecoming for Tanner, whose first solo exhibition was held at SBMA in 1967. Both shows are not to be missed.

In addition, the popular Parallel Stories series will return and take inspiration from the collaborative nature of artist spouses Ed and Nancy Reddin Kienholz. Celebrated author Rachel Cusk, along with her husband and artist Siemon Scamell-Katz, and their longtime friend, award-winning author Andrew Winer, will participate in a discussion about the intersection of the visual arts and literature. There will also be an abundance of musical programming with the return of Grammy Award-winning musician Ted Nash, who will offer a synergistic concert involving student composers and musicians. In addition, the Catalyst Quartet and the Miró Quartet will perform at the Museum.

Finally, I wish to acknowledge that although we lost our dear friend Lady Leslie Ridley-Tree months ago, we are constantly reminded of her kindness and generosity. Please see a tribute to this much-admired champion and patron of the arts on page 14.

OUT OF JOINT: Joan Tanner



February 12 - May 14, 2023

McCormick, Wasserman and Family, Von Romberg, and Emmons Galleries

This is the most extensive exhibition of Joan Tanner's work in California to date and represents a homecoming for the artist. Her first solo exhibition was held at the Santa Barbara Museum of Art in 1967. A resident of Santa Barbara, Tanner regularly shows across the United States.

Courtesy of Joan Tanner, © 2022 riginally trained as a painter, Tanner's work has moved toward three dimensions, but throughout her career, she has grounded her activity in the practice of drawing. For over a decade, Tanner has made sculptures like *Yellow Mesh* from generic construction materials, plastic corrugated roofing sheets, re-bar, cast concrete, zip ties, drywall, c-clamps, safety netting, and plywood. In her hands, the most forgettable of factory-made construction materials become gravity-defying confections with flamboyant curves, brilliant colors, and an informality that flirts with chaos. Rather than trying to tame disorder, Tanner's peculiar sculptures channel entropy and make the loose ends possibilities for persistent revision. This feeling of unfinishedness is essential to her sculpture.

Out of Joint is co-curated by James Glisson, SBMA Curator of Contemporary Art, and Julien Robson, Director, Great Meadows Foundation, Louisville, KY.

Scenes from a Marriage: Ed & Nancy Kienholz


ike a skeletal stage set, the *Bout Round Eleven* sculpture implies the architecture of a home with the windows, walls, and rooms partially indicated. The wife, dressed in pink, looks to the world outside, while he is lost in the violent fantasies of television. They are physically close but emotionally distant. This relationship is over, past the point of fighting. They are at round eleven after ten rounds in the ring. This focused exhibition is an occasion to celebrate a significant gift and to think about the artistic partnership between Nancy and Ed, which began in 1971 and continued until Ed's death in 1994. After his passing, Nancy continued to make art and manage the legacy and estate. The exhibition also contains a work by Ed on his own, *One and One Half Tits* (1960), a recent gift of Martha Gabbert, and a piece by Nancy on her own, *Home Sweet Home* (2006). This is an incendiary send up of modern domesticity and the unfortunate role that TV had in reshaping family life during the 20th century.




and Alexander Archipenko, this exhibition dwells on the dark side of humanity through a host of cruel but unforgettable imagery.

ystopic representations of women culminate in Frank Gallo's cast polyester resin from 1963, gifted to the Museum by founder, Wright Ludington.

The drawing called *The Horror*, after which this is a facsimile print (above), was published by the artist in a limited edition known as the Weber Portfolio. It was inspired by Edgar Allan Poe's 1841 short story, *A Descent into the Maelstrom*. The imagery, however, is Kubin's own invention.

RECENT ACQUISITIONS



CONTEMPORARY ART

Darren Waterson has worked in this evocative dream-like mode for years and can be compared to James McNeil Whistler, especially the famed Nocturne in Black and Gold; Falling Rockets (1875). One word often connected to Whistler is afflatus, which means breath, wind, inspiration, and motivation, and this seems fitting for Waterson. This painting feels as if it were underwater or even aloft, as if the translucent tubes at the center were buoyant or balloons. The branches on the left could be coral or sea fans and the glowing tubes at the center resemble sea tunicates. The dark background and lower part of painting could be turbid water or sediment. This relationship to the natural world is not one-to-one, even if this is a landscape. The direct observation of the natural world has been distilled in the artist's mind into forms that have a resemblance but are not a copy.



ASIAN ART

The Museum recently received ten gifts of Asian art from Helene Pollock before she passed away earlier this year at the age of 103. They are mostly religious works from the Indian subcontinent and in addition, a Japanese woodblock triptych print formerly belonging to the Herbert R. Cole collection. Among the gifts are two *Cosmic Man* paintings on cloth, reflective of the Indian concept that the cosmos and the human body are both understood as expressions of a common energy system. Illustrated here is a diagram of Jain cosmology as visualized in an abstract human body, originally used as an instructional tool for meditation. Another notable gift is an 11th-century Indian stone Votive Stupa with multiple Buddhas and female Bodhisattva Tara,



indicative of the later development of Buddhism as it spread throughout Asia. These welcomed additions will be selectively on view in the newly reinstalled gallery of the Art of South, Southeast Asia, and the Himalayas on Level 2.



PHOTOGRAPHY

In this dazzling photograph, Awol Erizku depicts a beautifully-feathered falcon alighting on a falconer's glove as two planets hover beyond. This riveting image is from a series Erizku based on seeing the Great Sphinx of Giza, Egypt. Greco-Roman Sphinxes contain wings, yet the Giza Sphinx does not: Erizku here plays on the fact that the wingless Giza Sphinx came first. Another work from this series is SBMA's marvelous rotating sculpture, Nefertiti-Miles Davis (Gold), in the State Street entrance. Both sculpture and photograph testify to Erizku's engagement with Egypt's rich visual history and relate to how Egypt has been revered as a powerful African nation by many Black Americans. Born in Ethiopia and raised in the South Bronx, New York, Erizku fuses imagery from art history and popular culture to center an Afro-centric presence into contemporary art, his aim to broaden art's canon outward from long-dominant Euro-centric aesthetics.

EDUCATION PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT *In Gratitude...What Place Makes Possible Ridley-Tree Education Center at McCormick House*

The visionary leadership of Lady Leslie Ridley-Tree is responsible for the transformation in 1991 of the large residence left to the Museum by the remarkable Katharine Dexter McCormick into an important educational resource and center for SBMA's art-making programs.

As the needs of both the Santa Barbara community and the Museum have changed over the past decades, the Ridley Tree Education Center (RTEC) at McCormick House has evolved and remained at the heart of SBMA's mission to integrate art into the lives of people.

Perhaps best known for its winter, spring, and summer art camps and workshops, RTEC is also home to after-school classes, teacher workshops, docent board meetings, adult studio and parent child classes, rehearsals, student art exhibitions, and receptions. The four classrooms are not only sunlit studio spaces opening to the outdoors, but also serve as offices and studio prep rooms for the Museum's Teaching Artists.


Adapting to a variety of circumstances and requests from the Museum's non-profit partners, RTEC has served as the classroom space for Crane School when that campus was closed due to the debris flow and fire; it has been an extension of the classrooms of VADA and Knox schools; and has been a site for innovative partnership and planning meetings with the library, poets in the schools, Opera Santa Barbara, AHA!, and the Santa Barbara Poet Laureate.

Perhaps the most dramatic, transformative role for RTEC has been since 2017, when the Museum designated the apartment attached to RTEC as an artist residency. Since then, SBMA has hosted a distinguished stream of award-winning artists, writers, musicians, and scholars, making it possible for them to stay for extended periods in order to deliver lectures, readings, classes, performances, and workshops and participate in collaborative community programs with UCSB, SBCC, Westmont, and the Santa Barbara Symphony. A partial list of those in residence include internationally renowned artists Valeska Soares, Charles Long, and Marshall Brown; writers Colm Tóibín, Rachel Cusk, Carmen Boullosa, Jane Smiley, Richard Rodriguez, and Patricio Ferrari; and composer-musician Ted Nash.

When Lady Ridley-Tree first envisioned the studio art-making potential of RTEC, even she might not have realized the importance of this timeless transformative teaching space. It is a rich and rare resource given by an even rarer woman of foresight, wisdom, grace, and generosity. The promise embodied in that initial gift is renewed in every drawing, painting, performance, and partnership made within its walls. Thank you Leslie!





wo ways that SBMA connects with students who wouldn't otherwise have access to art education is by providing instruction on school campuses via ArtReach and through a partnership with the School District-managed ASES A-OK! After School Program.

Most recently, students across Santa Barbara worked with SBMA Teaching Artists on their school campuses to learn art principles such as line, form, and shading. The Teaching Artists emphasized the school district's prioritization of culturally responsive teaching by connecting the lessons to the Mexican tradition of Día de los Muertos or Day of the Dead. The students took inspiration from artists in the SBMA collection who are deceased and honored family and friends who have passed away. Themes of identity, loss, remembrance, and reflection were woven into the lessons. The paintings and multimedia pieces that the students created were assembled into altars, or ofrendas, which were on display throughout the Museum for the 33rd Free Family Day of Día de los Muertos on October 23 and admired by nearly 1,400 visitors.

The experience of learning about the methods, materials, and techniques artists use within a meaningful and familiar cultural context helps students to engage both intellectually and personally. Teachers universally confirm that the benefits of introducing art into the school day can be seen and felt inside and outside the classroom building empathy, confidence, and community.

Tribute: LADY LESLIE RIDLEY-TREE

The Museum is mourning the loss of one of its great champions and patrons, Lady Leslie Ridley-Tree. For more than 30 years, she, and the late Lord Ridley-Tree, played active and influential roles in the life of the Museum.



ord and Lady Ridley-Tree were honored as recipients of the Wright S. Ludington Award, given for distinguished service to SBMA, in 1999. Their generous support and leadership have positively and permanently altered the quality and character of the Santa Barbara Museum of Art.

Leslie served as President of the Board of Trustees from 1994 to 1996 and became a Life Honorary Trustee in 2014. She served on the Executive, Development, Finance, Governance and Nominating, and Investment committees during her two terms on the Board. She was also actively involved in the Peck Wing renovation campaign committee.

In addition to holding various governance positions at the Museum, Leslie was also a generous contributor. She helped expand the Museum's collection with many important gifts of works of art, including Claude Monet's *Afternoon on the* Seine (1897); Paul Signac's Herblay – The Riverbank (1889); and many others. Additionally, several significant exhibitions were made possible thanks to the generosity of the Ridley-Trees, including Eternal China: Splendors from the First Dynasties (1998); Portrayal/Betrayal: Portraits from 1950 to the Present (2012); Botticelli, Titian, and Beyond: Masterpieces of Italian Painting from Glasgow Museums (2015); and most recently, the enormously successful and critically acclaimed Through Vincent's Eyes: Van Gogh and His Sources (2022).



In 1991, a significant gift from the Ridley-Trees made possible the renovation of McCormick House and inaugurated the Ridley-Tree

Education Center, where art classes are provided. The Ridley-Tree Foundation has provided generous support for the Center's scholarship program, making studio art classes and summer art camp available to children who otherwise would not be able to participate. In 1998, the new three-story Peck Wing addition was unveiled with a children's gallery, café, larger store, and the addition of the Paul and Leslie Ridley-Tree Gallery in the Museum. Leslie was a lead contributor to the Museum's *Imagine More* \$50 million capital campaign for the renewed and expanded galleries which reopened in August 2021.

Larry J. Feinberg, Robert and Mercedes Eichholz Director and CEO, states, "No one contributed more to this institution than Leslie, having served admirably on the board for 15 years, three of them as its dynamic Chair, establishing the Ridley-Tree Education Center, and overseeing the 1998 renovation and the creation of the Paul and Leslie Ridley-Tree Gallery in the Museum. She also underwrote numerous important exhibitions and gifted several significant artworks to the collection. These donations and enterprises were, of course, only some of the many, many major contributions that she made to myriad institutions in Santa Barbara over three decades. She was a larger than life personality, filled with kindness, high spirit, and wit, and will never be forgotten in Santa Barbara or by any of us who were fortunate enough to know her."

n display in the Ridley-Tree Gallery is a group of Impressionist masterpieces by Cassatt, Degas, Monet, Pissarro, and Renoir on long-term loan to the Museum from the late Michael Armand Hammer and the Armand Hammer Foundation. These paintings were originally acquired by Michael Armand Hammer's grandfather, the industrialist Armand Hammer. Michael, who passed away recently, was a generous friend to the Museum and member of the SBMA Board of Trustees from 2011 to 2015. He was a major contributor to the exhibition *Van Gogh to Munch: European Masterworks from the Armand Hammer Foundation and the Sarah Campbell Blaffer Foundation*, presented at the Santa Barbara Museum of Art in 2011. Over the last decade, paintings from his personal collection have resided intermittently in the galleries as guests of honor. They are testament to the philanthropic legacy of Michael Armand Hammer, to whom we pay tribute in memoriam.
