# SHAPE, GROUND, SHADOW

The Photographs of Ellsworth Kelly

October 15, 2023 - January 14, 2024 McCormick and Wasserman and Family Galleries

This landmark exhibition presents 60 photographs by Ellsworth Kelly (1923–2015), one of the most renowned artists of the last 100 years. From the late 1940s into the 21st century, Kelly forged an era-defining body of abstract art based on shapes, forms, and scenarios that he perceptively found in the everyday world. Largely made for himself, Kelly's photographs capture these shapes and forms in tightly composed, classic gelatin silver prints.

**♦** The earliest photographs in the exhibition date from 1950 during Kelly's summer stay with friends on France's southern Atlantic coast. Images such as the sharply graphic Shadows on Stairs, Villa La Combe, Meschers, introduce Kelly's unique practice of singling out and registering specific forms in the natural and constructed environment. Kelly did not use photographs as source material, however: after he produced a number of drawings based on the dramatic contrasts he saw in this staircase/shadow phenomenon, Kelly went back to photograph this same scene for his own memory and information. The result is one of Kelly's most mesmerizing and complex images that continues to fascinate decades after its creation.





From the start of his career, photography for Kelly was one more artistic way to brilliantly capture and translate into art his singular visual experiences of the world around him. Extraordinary works of art in their own right, Kelly's photographs offer viewers a uniquely direct and vivid opportunity to see Kelly's eye and mind at work like no other genre of art he ever created.

Organized by the Santa Barbara Museum of Art, this is the first museum exhibition solely devoted to Kelly's photographs, all of which are being generously lent by the Ellsworth Kelly Foundation in Spencertown, NY. In addition, SBMA is the only West Coast museum to take part in EK100, the 2023 centennial celebration of Kelly's birth that includes exhibitions at The Museum of Modern Art, New York; The Art Institute of Chicago; Glenstone Museum, Potomac, Maryland; Philadelphia Museum of Art; La Fondazione Nicola Del Roscio, Rome, and additional US and international venues throughout 2023 into 2024.

The exhibition is accompanied by a fully-illustrated catalogue produced by SBMA featuring all 60 photographs in the exhibition, an essay by Charles Wylie, SBMA Curator of Photography and New Media, and a reprint of Ellsworth Kelly's 1991 Aperture magazine interview with Charles Hagen.

# FLOWERS ON A RIVER: THE ART OF CHINESE FLOWER-AND-BIRD PAINTING, 1368-1911

Masterworks from Tianjin Museum and Changzhou Museum

October 15, 2023 - January 14, 2024 Emmons and Von Romberg Galleries

> Showcasing masterpieces of Chinese painting spanning 500 years, this exhibition marks the first showing of works that have traveled from China to the U.S. since the onset of the pandemic. The exhibition premiered at the China Institute Gallery in New York earlier this year, and SBMA is the presentation's second and final venue in the United States. The Museum will offer a reduced presentation to focus on some of the most important works in the original exhibition, featuring 21 individual works and 17 artists.

his exhibition offers a historical examination of the much-appreciated but understudied genre of flower-and-bird painting, including hanging scrolls, handscrolls, and albums, from the 15th to early 20th centuries (Ming and Qing dynasties (1368–1911). Presented in three sections: Court Artists and the Imperial Taste, Literati and Individual Expression, and Flower-and-Bird Painting in Daily Life, the presentation explores the natural world in terms of human experience, reflecting the deeply-rooted Chinese concept of "humanity in harmony with nature." Most of the paintings are selected from the prestigious Tianjin Museum in northeastern China, where some of the most significant paintings from China's long history reside. The remaining pieces come from the Changzhou City Museum in southern China, where a distinct regional style developed and dominated from the late 17th century onwards.






One of the most important highlights in the exhibition is the premier showing of the 42-foot-long monochromatic handscroll painting, Flowers on a River (1697), by the eminent monk/artist Zhu Da, or better known as Bada Shanren (1626-1705). Painted late in life, seven years before his death, Flowers on a River is a masterpiece of Bada Shanren's life journey told through lotus flowers accompanied with orchids and bamboo in a landscape of boulders and streams. Lotuses are symbols of purity in both the Buddhist and secular worlds, and they remain Bada Shanren's most enduring and personal expressions throughout his artistic life. The Santa Barbara Museum of Art will be the only U.S. venue that enables visitors to view the entire painted image of this monumental work.

# FROM COPPER PLATE TO COLLOTYPE: A Guide to the Technical History of Making Multiples

October 8, 2023 - January 28, 2024 Davidson and Colefax Galleries

Drawing from the rich holdings of prints and 19th- to early 20th-century photographs in SBMA's permanent collection, Copper Plate to Collotype makes visible the vibrant exchange between the two media.



ighlights include etchings from James Tissot's 1876 The Thames series, early color photography by Santa Barbara artist William Leon Dawson, portrait photography by Gertrude Käsebier—one of the first women photographers featured in Camera Work magazine—and an animal locomotion study by the English photographic pioneer Edward Muybridge. A range of reproductive techniques have been selected to demonstrate the tools and techniques utilized by artists working in the graphic arts at the turn of the

last century, from the copper plate to the gelatin silver, albumen, and collotype print.

#### AMERICAN ART

Walt Kuhn specialized in the depiction of the fringe characters of the entertainment world—stage performers, acrobats, and clowns—all subjects that had been explored by the European avant-garde in the late 19th century.

This newly-gifted painting by SBMA Sustaining Trustee Nancy Schlosser features one of Kuhn's favorite models: Gertrude Lower, a chorus girl in the traveling version of the popular 1927 musical Show Boat, which was scored by Oscar Hammerstein. It joins the monumental standing portrait of the same model already in the permanent collection. The standing portrait exudes Trude's unselfconsciousness



in her semi nudity, as she confronts us, hands on hips with a look of easy defiance. The seated portrait, by contrast, bristles with the hostility of Trude's unblinking stare. The heat of Trude's body and mood radiates from the artist's strategic use of vermillion, as she dares us to look away now that her body is again her own, rather than the spectacle that it had been on stage.



#### **CONTEMPORARY ART**

The world is overburdened with things. Manufactured and handmade, they swirl around the globe in cargo ships, planes, trucks, and mopeds. Rina Banerjee takes these castoff items and makes allegories about the endless flows of people and things across national borders. This process is often violent, and the artist has spoken of her art relating to "wounded colonized spaces." Banerjee was born in Kolkata, India in 1963 to a Bengali family, that later moved to Queens, NY when she was seven. She has spoken about the feelings of alienation:

"To summarize is to destroy the parts. I did not believe that the pieces could form one recognizable body of work. I thought for sure that it was a fragmented and misplaced parcel—a clumsy process of bringing the loose objects to bond and become sculpture." The notion of a misplaced parcel, something mailed that became misdirected along the journey is a way to understand this sculpture.



This painting by **Emmi Whitehorse** contains a language of symbols that stand for the plants, animals, and people in New Mexico, where Whitehorse. an enrolled member of the Navajo Nation,

was born and continues to live. The artist has said, "My paintings tell the story of knowing land over time—of being completely, microcosmically within a place."





# **EDUCATION PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT**

# Reuse, Remake, Recycle, Restyle, Repeat

The above series of words has become a mantra of sorts over the past several months, as a diverse mix of summer art camp and Santa Barbara School District summer session students, as well as local K–12 Art and STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math) teachers explored issues surrounding sustainability, consumption, and climate change through a number of creative reuse art-making lessons.

Projects included bags made of salvaged Museum banners, "tv dinners" made of recycled beads, string, cardboard, and fabric inspired by Robert Heineken, sketchbooks reformed from the covers of old children's books, and "friends" constructed from found paper, charcoal, fabric, and twine, inspired by the work of James Castle. The resulting student and teacher created works of art vividly and joyfully express how the Museum can be an endless source of inspiration and how creativity can be used to cut down waste and reduce our ecological footprint. Transforming discarded material into art—or upcycling—is just one of the myriad opportunities for transformation at the center of education and the Museum experience.



# Museum Announces Appointment OF AMADA CRUZ AS NEW DIRECTOR

The Museum is pleased to announce the appointment of Amada Cruz as the Eichholz Foundation Director. Her role will officially begin October 30, 2023.



ruz comes to SBMA from the Seattle Art Museum where she served as the Illsley Ball Nordstrom Director and CEO since 2019. She states, "I am thrilled to be joining SBMA with its important mission 'to integrate art into the lives of people.' That inspiring charge is a call to engage the different communities of the Santa Barbara region. I look forward to working with the staff and Board to build upon the strong foundation of scholarly exhibitions and robust educational programs established under my predecessor, Larry Feinberg."

Cruz is an experienced museum director and former curator. She has been a champion of inclusion, diversity, and equity in her past positions and will continue to build on the Museum's long-term and ongoing commitment to these values, as well as its strong record of scholarship and culturally vibrant programming.

Over her 30-year career, Cruz has held posts as the Director

of the Phoenix Art Museum; Executive Director at San Antonio-based Artpace, an artist residency program; Director of the Center for Curatorial Studies Museum at Bard College, where she co-organized the first US museum survey of Takashi Murakami's work; and Acting Chief Curator and Manilow Curator of Exhibitions at the Museum of Contemporary Art in Chicago. Cruz has also worked as a grant maker and was the founding Program Director for United States Artists in Los Angeles, where she formed longstanding relationships with artists around the country and was responsible for all programming activities of a Ford and Rockefeller Foundations initiative. She also has been Executive Director of Artadia: The Fund for Art and Dialogue in New York City, which awarded grants to visual artists in San Francisco, Houston, and Chicago.

Born in Havana, Cuba, Cruz received a bachelor's degree in art history and political science at New York University. She received the 2018 Virginia Cardenas Arts Advocacy Award by Xico, an Arizona cultural institution serving Latinx and Indigenous artists.




