


## Pick a Summer Posy

## Scavenger Hunt Activity

Artists often choose to paint flowers. Sometimes they are carefully arranged in vases, sometimes they grow in gardens, sometimes they seem so real that you could pluck them from their stems, sometimes they are just a squiggly line or a quick smudgy sketch from the artist's imagination.

We invite you to imagine these works from the Museum's collection as a garden. Look closely at the details of individual flowers pictured here and sketch your favorites. If you like, you can add your blossoms to the bouquet that is started for you in the line drawing on the next page. Then, color your "posy" or bunch of flowers any way you like using paints, pencils, markers, or crayons. Remember, in the artist's imagination a rose doesn't have to be red!
